



Cooking

Allowing children to help prepare food can provide them with so many learning opportunities. It doesn't always have to be baking a cake, or following an elaborate recipe. Making a sandwich can cover the following areas of learning:

· Literacy - reading the labels on the bread/ butter/jam...

· Maths- looking at expiry dates for number recognition, cutting the sandwich into squares or triangles

Communication and language - following instructions

Physical development - spreading butter or spreads for wrist control, talking about healthy/ unhealthy diets...

The value of money

- · A great idea is to have a basket of snacks they are allowed throughout the day, each with a price on them.
- · Give your child a certain amount of money and the choice as to when and what they buy.
- They will learn that if they want the unhealthier chocolate bar, it will cost them more than the healthy apple, and therefore wont have as much money to spend on other snack during the day.
- Not only does this teach them to value of money, but also about taking ownership over the decisions they make!
